Training Journal - April 2004

This is the first in a series of articles about some training techniques that may be interesting or useful for anyone who wants to train their dog – from family pet to show dog to working dog. Comments, suggestions are welcome and may be directed to Roslyn Beaman at beapudel@hotmail.com

"Owen", a busy and outgoing miniature poodle, came into my home in December of 2003 to start his working career after successfully completing his Canadian Championship. It only took 48 hours for this youngster to settle in. We started working on some house rules (like don't encourage everyone else to chase the squirrels please, and yes, you must sleep in your crate!) once he had figured out where he was in the pack of six dogs.

My training methods have changed over the years and although I am a big proponent of positive training, using a clicker was something I couldn't seem to get my head around. With my older female mini I started her on clicker when she was a pup and although I moved on to other ways of training her for some activities, I've decided that if I want to get the best performance from her, it's the clicker that seems to work. She obviously made the connection! So, with Owen, being an adult dog when he arrived in my home, I decided to continue with the clicker training. If you're interested in learning the history and details about clicker training, I recommend Karen Pryor's book "Don't Shoot the Dog". A simpler, and more user-friendly book, "Click for Joy" is a terrific tool for beginners not interested in the who, what and where's.

As Owen is going to be trained in a variety of activities, I like to start with some basics which can be used in several areas (obedience, field, agility for instance). Since Owen was shown in conformation, he likes to be on my left side – this I can encourage for obedience training, and he has naturally good attention for this. However, for agility I also like a dog who can work on both right and left sides so we have been working on getting him comfortable with being on either side. This involves games of luring with treats in big and small circles, click and treating him when he speeds up to reach my hand with the treat in it. I have to work hard to keep my body posture in the best position – with either my right or left shoulder turned towards him depending on which side we're working on. Having a miniature I have to watch I don't spend a lot of time bending over, which is a natural thing for me to do. Those lucky enough to have a larger dog will find this game lots of fun as well.

We have also been working on recalls – Owen has had to learn a new call name, and a new owner – so it is important that he come on a reliable basis. Basically each time I used his name I treat him for responding, and now he readily turns his head when called. As for doing the formal recall, when we first did a restrained one he was more interested in the person holding him than me (well, he is outgoing!). However, the whole point is to get him focused on ME, not everyone else. We have a tug toy (lengths of fleece braided together) and he is teased with it at home, but not allowed to play with it except when I bring it out. So in a recall situation, he is physically held (hands on his chest, not held by the collar), I walk ahead about 5 feet, get into a position to run, and say "ready, ready". The first time his head was looking everyone but at me, but once released he did chase me. By the second week of doing this he had so much enthusiasm he almost escaped from the holder's arms. He ran like a fool, chasing me and gets his tug as a reward. This builds a bond between the two of us that is very important for working in agility and flyball.

Although Owen does love to jump (like from the kitchen steps to the back door without touching the floor) he does have to learn a proper jumping technique. This will help ensure his safety while doing agility as well as save time when on course. We start with just two jump standards, and a pole on the ground. By doing recalls or just running with him through the standards, this teaches him that the standards aren't anything to worry about. Then we put the pole up to about 6 inches so he actually has to jump over it. Each time he attempts it, he gets a click and a treat. It is important to run him from both sides so he gets used to jumping whether I and on the right or the left. Once a single jump has been mastered, I can then progress to having him do two jumps at once, remembering to click and treat after only both have been done. Again, we end the session with a game of tug or just some fun teasing.

Owen has also been introduced to field work. We've started teaching him to bring an object back – we have plastic bumpers, and an obedience dumbell and will be introducing birds eventually. Again, I'm using the click/treat method to always have a positive attitude while training. There are no "NO's" here. You can imagine that we go through a lot of treats but the fun thing about training is that you can do it anywhere and anytime. It's not uncommon for my dogs to have to shake a paw, roll over or go touch the wall before dinner is served.

If you're interested in learning more about training techniques, there are various sources you can access. "Citizen Canine" by Gillian Ridgeway and Kathryn Harvey (www.citizencanine.com) is a good introduction. I've found a great clicker resource at www.shirleychong.com. Whatever you read, remember it takes time to teach a dog, and patience, but if you do it with a twinkle in your eye, and a smile you'll enjoy the process much more.

PCC National Judge Profile:

Judging the PCC National on July 30/04 will be Rodi Hubenthal from Norway.



Mr. Hubenthal was licensed for his first breeds in 1969 (Doberman and Rottweiler) and later the same year for all Sighthounds and regularly since then, licensed for all new breeds until 1992 when he graduated as an FCI All Breeds Judge.

During the last 30 years he has, together with his wife **Wera**, bred about 130 champions under the prefix "Picador", Doberman, German Pinschers, Miniature Pinschers, Whippets and Briards.

Mr. Hubenthal was the founder of the Norwegian German Pinscher Club and also the Norwegian Briard Club.
