OF NOTE

Dear Members,

I'm really happy to see how many of you have embraced the new system for adding your litter information to the website and this has saved me a huge amount of work. There are a few things I would like to bring to your attention just to keep things running smoothly and help improve opportunities for finding homes for your litters:

- 1. If the litter is already born, please format your listing title as follows: **Your Kennel Name Date of Birth (insert date).** The system automatically adds your location to the right of your listing.
- If you are expecting a litter soon, please format your title as follows: Your Kennel Name –
 Litter Expected (insert date). And of course, when the puppies arrive you can change the title to Date of Birth
- 3. The listings are automatically set to expire 180 days after they are added to the site. Hopefully you will have sold all your puppies by this date. If the litter all have homes before this date, please delete your listing.
- 4. If you live outside a major urban area, please fill in the **County/Village/Other** field. Many people probably look for a breeder close by, so this is important. For example, if you are in Pefferlaw, Ontario, someone in may Toronto may not know where Pefferlaw is, but they probably recognize York Region or Newmarket, so in this field you could enter "45 miles NE of Newmarket" or "York Region" or both anything that helps people find you.
- 5. And of course, if you have a website, make sure you include it.

Some members have gotten really overzealous and have used creative headings such as "Boys, Boys, Boys" or "Show or Performance Prospects". In the interests of maintaining a level playing field for all members, please use the heading format in points 1 and 2 above. The "Ad Details" section is where this you can be really creative. I recommend putting this content in the first couple of lines so that it is visible when website visitors go to the page for your variety of Poodle (standard, miniature, toy or adult). **Until I** am otherwise notified by the PCC Executive, any listings entered in any other format will be changed to the format suggested above.

You also have the ability to put include up to four photos in your listing and I encourage you to use it. Obviously you should consider using two of the images for the parents but then you also have two other opportunities for pictures of the puppies to show them to their best advantage, but it is completely up to you how you want to use this space. It's probably a great idea to update the puppy photos every couple of weeks to show how they're growing because they do grow quickly.

I know that when the litter information was added to the site before usually the older litters were listed at the top of the listings. Unfortunately with the plugin that we are using for this system this is not possible. But the advantages of the new system outweigh that one issue. The fact that you can now get your litters up faster without having to wait for someone else to have the time to do it for you and the fact that you can update your listings on your own should help you sell your puppies sooner.



Do you own, breed, or handle miniature or standard poodles?

- Researchers at the University of Missouri would like to invite you to participate in a research study examining social behavior in miniature and standard poodles.
- Participation in this study involves the completion of an online survey. Owners, breeders, or handlers of
 miniature and/or standard poodles are eligible for the survey. This survey asks about the general social
 behaviors of a dog, such as attention, gesturing, and eye contact. Other information collected by the survey
 includes general health and training information.
- This study will provide insight into dog social behavior and how it relates to human behavior, especially in terms of social disorders such as autism. Shelley Green-Wooldridge, AKC handler, has advised the study investigators that social behaviors similar to autism have been observed in a subset of miniature and standard poodles. With thirty years of experience in working with poodles, Green-Wooldridge believes that this breed seems to be most appropriate to study for social behavior.

Dear Directors of the Poodle Club of Canada,

The Ontario Veterinary College (OVC) is dedicated to improving the health and welfare of animals by advancing veterinary health care, learning and research.

One of the ways we do this is by providing and intermediate and comprehensive clinical environment that supports the development of new treatments to benefit our animal companions. This letter is to inform you and members of the Poodle Club and you about a new initiative under way at OVC aimed at better understanding a disease called atlantoaxial instability. This disease frequently affects small and toy breed dogs and Toy Poodles in particular.

To help get the word out, we're asking you to share a brief article with your members explaining what this disease is, how it can affect their pets and how they can participate in or support ongoing research at OVC.

Educational Memorial Program Can Help Find Treatments for Atlantoaxial Instability

The education of health professionals has always relied on study of anatomy to ensure that practitioners have the knowledge and experience required to provide optimal care for their patients.

The Ontario Veterinary College (OVC) is working with pet owners and animal shelters to provide learning opportunities for our students and to support investigations to find answers for specific diseases. To assist us, we have an Educational Memorial Program whereby owners whose pets are being euthanized can donate their pet's body to OVC. During this difficult time after loss of a pet, owners may find some consolation for their grief in knowing that their pet will help others in the future.

The OVC Educational Memorial Program is similar to the University of Guelph's willed body program that supports the human anatomy program. The OVC Educational Memorial Program helps veterinary students learn and helps investigators find solutions to disease problems.

Educational Memorial Program Can Help Find Treatments for Atlantoaxial Instability

Investigators are looking at a specific disease, atlantoaxial instability, that affects miniature and toy breeds. Due to their small size, these breeds have variations in the anatomy of their neck that affects the success of treatment of this disease.

Any toy breed dog owner can help support this important research by donating the body of their late pets to the OVC Educational Memorial Program. Breeders and veterinarians can encourage their clients to do the same. The dog does not have to have this disease in order to be helpful.

This generous gift will be greatly appreciated as each donation will help us take better care for our beloved pets. The donation is usually done through the family veterinarian who can directly contact the OVC. This research can also been supported simply by communicating this information to the toy breed community. So please "spread the word" among your friends and other members of toy breed clubs. Current research on atlantoaxial instability is funded by the OVC Pet Trust Fund. Therefore, supporting the OVC Pet Trust Fund is another way to support this field of research. You can find further information on this charitable fund at www.ovc.uoguelph.ca/pettrust/.

Information about Atlantoaxial (AA) Instability

Atlantoaxial (AA) instability is most commonly caused by congenital malformations of the second neck vertebra (also known as *axis*). These malformations are most frequently seen in younger to middle-aged toy breed dogs (including Yorkshire terriers, Chihuahuas, miniature and toy poodles, and Pomeranians). Dogs may start showing signs early in life after a minor incident such as playing with another dog or falling from a chair. The symptoms can range from neck pain to paralysis and may even cause breathing problems and sudden death.

Treatment options include conservative management or surgical stabilization. For conservative management of AA instability, the neck is immobilized with a brace for several weeks to several months. This treatment has been reported to have a 57% success rate and is usually considered a viable option in younger dogs with an initial, acute onset of clinical signs.

Surgical management involves stabilizing the AA joint through placement of vertebral implants and sometimes bone grafts to fuse the atlas and axis. Surgical AA fusion offers a 65-86% success rate and is considered the best therapeutic option in many cases. However, while AA surgical stabilization provides the best clinical outcome, it remains one of the most challenging procedures performed by veterinary neurosurgeons. Due to the small size of the affected dogs, there is a very small margin for error.

In the past 15 years, most of the research on atlantoaxial instability has been focused on determining the best surgical technique to stabilize the atlantoaxial joint. Veterinary neurosurgeons have shared their experience and compared their success using various bone methods. However, at this time the choice of the technique and the type of implants to be used relies mainly on the personal experience of the surgeon rather than scientific data. Proving the superiority of one technique over another will require studies using cadavers.

Educational Memorial Program Can Help Find Treatments for Atlantoaxial Instability

A research group at the OVC is working to establish detailed data on anatomy of the atlantoaxial joint of miniature and toy breed dogs. The research group is also determining which surgical techniques provide the safest and strongest spinal stabilization. The long-term goal is to formulate guidelines to help neurosurgeons choose the safest and most appropriate surgical technique for their patients. The goal is to reduce the risks associated with these procedures so that more of these dogs live normal, happy lives.

Attention Poodle Owners and Breeders:

IDENTIFYING THE FOUNDERS OF THE STANDARD POODLE BREED

As the first step in compiling a global pedigree database for the Standard Poodle, the Institute of Canine Biology is putting out a call for information. We are attempting to compile a complete list of Founders of the Poodle breed (all sizes). Since the original Poodle was a European landrace breed, there are at least four studbooks which contain founding populations (Germany, France, Russia and England). There may be more contained in other kennel registries.

Please help us find the answers to the following questions:

- 1. What is the date when the first Poodle of any size was registered in your country's studbook?
- 2a. Did the first Poodles registered in your country have foreign registration numbers (from which country) and do you have their pedigrees?

2b. Were the first Poodles registered "pedigree unknown"?

- 2c. Or was it a combination of both?
- 3. When was the date(s) when the sizes (or coat types) were separated into different breeds?
- 4. Did any breeders in your country keep a private pedigree register before your national registry was established?
- 5. Is your studbook complete or are there missing years because of war, etc?
- 6. When was the last date a Poodle with an unknown or incomplete pedigree was registered in your studbook? Can unregistered Poodles still be added to the studbook?
- 7. Are there unregistered working Poodles still existing in your country (the landrace population)?

GOALS

- 1) Compile global pedigree database back to founders
- 2) Determine current genetic status of the breed: genetic diversity, degree of inbreeding, average kinship, loss of founder alleles, effective population size, contribution of ancestors, etc.
- 4) Determine genetic substructure of the population;
- 5) Evaluate potential for genetic improvement through strategic breeding of current reproductive individuals;
- 6) Design and implement a goal-oriented breeding strategy to improve and sustain genetic health.
- 7) Establish a permanent, freely accessible, online pedigree database with population genetic statistics and pedigree generation. Integrate pedigree database with health information and DNA/genotyping data.
- 8) Yearly evaluation of the genetic status of the global breed population and regional subpopulations, adjustment of breeding strategy if necessary, with analysis and reports available online.
- 9) DNA analysis of the breed to identify the genetic background of the breed (as has been done by Huson for Alaskan sled dogs) and the presence of known canine genetic defects in the gene pool. Genotyping of dogs with extensive information about phenotype of a dog and its relatives will permit establishing estimated breeding values (EBV) that can be used by breeders for more effective selection in breeding programs.

PROGRESS

We have a pedigree database with >190,000 dogs that date to the 1880s that is currently being evaluated for errors and completeness. However, we have been unable to identify the founders of the breed. We have therefore initiated a global call for information from kennel clubs, registries, and private individuals that will allow us to identify the genetic founders of the registered Poodle breed.

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
