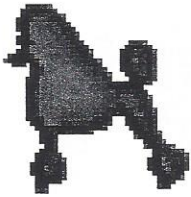


## Twenty Basic Breeding Principles



1. Don't make use of indiscriminate out-crosses, a judicious out-cross can be of great value; an injudicious one can produce an aggregation of every imaginable fault in the breed.
  2. Don't line breed just for the sake of line breeding. Line breeding complementary types can bring great rewards; with unsuitable ones it will lead to immediate disaster.
  3. Don't take advice from people who have always been unsuccessful breeders. If their opinions were worth having they would have proved it with their successes.
  4. Don't believe the popular cliché about the brother or sister of the great champion being just as good to breed from. For every one that is, hundreds are not. It depends on the animal concerned.
  5. Don't use your dogs with virtues they don't possess. Self-deceit is a stepping stone to failure.
  6. Don't breed from mediocrity's, the absence of a fault does not in any way signify the presence of its' corresponding virtue.
  7. Don't try to line two dogs at the same time, you will end up line breeding to neither.
  8. Don't assess the worth of a stud by his inferior progeny. All stud dogs sire rubbish at times. What matters most is how good their best efforts are.
  9. Don't allow personal feelings to influence your choice of a stud dog. The right dog for your bitch is the right dog who-ever owns it.
  10. Don't allow admiration of a stud dog to blind you to his faults. If you do you are asking for trouble.
  11. Don't mate together animals, which share the same fault. You are asking for trouble if you do.
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12. Don't forget it is the whole dog that counts. If you forget one virtue while searching for another you will pay for it.

13. Don't search for the perfect dog as a mate for your bitch. The perfect dog (or bitch) does not exist and never will.

14. Don't be frightened of breeding from animals that have obvious faults so long as they have compensating virtues. A lack of virtues is far the greatest fault of all.

15. Don't mate together non-complementary types. An ability to recognise type at a glance is a breeder's greatest gift. Ask the successful breeder to explain this subject - there is no way of learning. [I would define non-complementary types as ones, which have the same faults and the lack of virtues.]

16. Don't forget the necessity to preserve head quality. It will vanish like a dream if you do.

17. Don't forget that substance plus quality should be one of your aims. Any fool can breed with the other!

18. Don't forget a great head plus soundness should be another of your aims. Many people can never breed either.

19. Don't ever try to decry a great Poodle. A thing of beauty is not only a joy forever but, a great Poodle should be a source of aesthetic pride and pleasure to all true lovers of the breed.

20. Don't be satisfied with anything but the best. The second best is never good enough....

### Breeding Idea???

I have two English Setters now for my upland hunting. Over the years, with field trialing in both pointing and retrieving stakes, as well as waterfowl and upland hunting, I probably have trained over thirty dogs. I am stringently against backyard breeding, and only two of my dogs have I ever considered breeding. One was a black lab, who as a youngster made the National Derby List, and he was bred twice. The other one I would have liked to breed is the youngest of my present two setters. Many dogs with various personality quirks can be trained with some special handling, but a dog's ability to smell game is something that can't be taught; either the dog has it or not. This particular setter has an outstanding nose. Not only that, he is almost all white, has a solid stocky confirmation, and his tail is absolutely vertical when he is on point. So I decided to try breeding him.

The first time was a year ago. The female belonged to a professional dog trainer friend of mine, Jim, who lives about 80 miles south of me. I had purchased my dog, Thunder, from Jim as a pup and a last year brought him down to his birthplace, where Jim tried mating my dog to one of his female dogs. My dog would become very interested in the female, but he would only approach her from the side, never truly getting up on her, and he gave very little of the thrusting (to use the veterinary language) action. The two dogs never tied up. In speaking this over with my own vet, he thought that perhaps my male was overwhelmed by being in a strange kennel, and was intimidated. Thinking this might be the case, six months later, Jim brought the female to my kennel, but the same thing happened. One would think this activity would be natural for dogs to do. Apparently not always. I was taking this to heart, and found it embarrassing, since most hunters consider their dog an extension of themselves. When I field trialed in the Dixie Circuit thirty years ago, I remember clearly receiving the following advice from an older southern trainer: "You can sooner criticize a man's wife than his dog." My dog's failure was reflecting on my own macho sexual self-image.

Jim and I decided that perhaps his female may not have been giving off the correct odors and that we should try a different girl. Typical male thinking. We arranged to have a nice young lady, named Abby, whom Jim had trained and knew quite well, to serve as his host this time. She had already produced two litters, so we knew that she would know the ropes. I had even talked to the reproductive expert at the UW Veterinary School as to what to do if there was not a natural mating. It was agreed that we could bring the two dogs down to Madison and he would try artificial insemination (AI). The problem was that this is a three to four-hour round trip for Jim and he would have to drive through all of Madison to get to the school.

Jim picked up the young lady a week ago and brought her to his kennel. The next day, I brought Thunder down to meet his temporary wife. Well, as soon as they were together, she faced her butt to him and shifted her tail to the side, a sure sign that she wanted to see some action. No question, Thunder knew something was up, but he only licked her genitalia (this is a male's first clue the female is ready because of the sugar content in the discharge) without making any attempt at thrusting or mounting her. Jim made some phone calls and found a vet just this side of the Fox Valley (less than an hour away from him) who had an interest in dog reproduction problems and arranged for an AI session that afternoon. When he brought the dogs there, manipulations only produced a small amount of semen with poor sperm motility. The vaginal smear and progesterone blood test disclosed that the young lady would start her standing heat cycle today and, if normal, would last for 5 days. Normally, the male's sperm naturally inserted into the female stays viable for 5 days also. The vet suggested that the dogs should return to his clinic in another two days for another AI.

That was done three days ago. Manipulations of my male, which apparently are done with special instruments to simulate the female vagina and to catch the produced semen, and done while the female is next to him, were now unsuccessful. Nothing was produced. This was only the second dog from which the vet could not get a sample. Jim and I were getting depressed. But Abby had another week to go in her heat cycle, and Jim and I were now on a mission. What could we do to make the male act like a male. A third AI effort was scheduled for tomorrow.



Yesterday, I had an idea and bounced it off Jim. He said he would call the vet to get his thoughts. The vet laughed, and said he would try to gather some information about the idea, and get back to my friend. Jim lives about 40 minutes from the nearest pharmacy, and his wife Kay had to go to town that noon anyhow. But the vet never called back until late afternoon, and we had a decision to make by the late morning. Meanwhile, I had looked up the medication on the internet and found that there was no evidence of its use in animals except in Ireland. There, it had been given to Greyhounds to make them run faster in dog races, and because it had, had been banned from the sport. An Irish vet said that it was not harmful in dogs.

Given all this information, and to save Jim an extra trip to the pharmacy, we arranged that I would call the pharmacy and leave a prescription for Kay to pick up. Jim said his shoulders were broad in case word got around. When I retired three years ago, I kept my medical license so I can legally write prescriptions, but apparently canceled my federal narcotics permit since I didn't plan on dispensing those anyhow. But when I called the prescription in to the pharmacy, they wanted the federal permit number because this is how their computer keeps track of doctors. I looked up the number and gave it to them, not realizing at the time it had expired. The pharmacist made sure to tell Kay that her husband should take the viagra one hour before the happy moment.

I called my local urologist friend to find out any information important to our exercise, the most important being that it should be given on an empty stomach. We also decided to give the dog 1/2 of the lowest adult dose, and work up from there if need be. The Fox Valley vet called back to say he had called Pfizer and there had been no dog studies to test safety or dosage. He didn't disapprove, but by necessity, we were on our own. Jim and I decided to try the low dose yesterday, and if there was no response, to double the dose today. If still no response, than we would rest the dogs tomorrow (abstinence and the heart) and try the AI in two days on the higher dose.

Our theory was this. Viagra allows more blood inflow into the penis. If this occurs, the hope was that this would give Thunder the feeling that something is occurring down there and maybe he should try to find an opening in which to insert this feeling. I don't think this feeling is entirely limited to dogs.

So last evening, we gave the first dose. Immediate but incomplete response. The dog started thrusting to beat the band, standing on the tips of his toes, but not mounting his girlfriend, not even from the side. Obviously, he had the feeling but not the knowledge. But this certainly was a good sign, because now we felt we would be able to complete the AI tomorrow. But we still had today. I suggested to Jim that I could ride down today and help him if he felt that, by holding the dogs, we could direct the insertion. He said lets wait on that, but it is something he has done successfully before.

This evening the phone rang. It was Jim. This morning, he had put the two together without viagra and had the same response. A lot of activity, a lot of thrusting, but no mounting. This evening, he gave another viagra, and this time he kneeled next to Abby, put his knee under her stomach to support her, and lifted Thunder over her rump. **Whammo!** He put it where it was supposed to go and was thrusting like nature had intended. They tied for 13 minutes, which should give an adequate fertilization. I could see Jim's grin from ear to ear on the phone, and he could see mine. Now, with a little luck, we will hopefully have a litter, and hopefully the pharmacist will not know that I gave an outdated narcotic license number, and I will not lose my medical license for prescribing viagra to a dog. And yes, my ego is still intact!

This year, for the second time in the history of the Sportsman's Show in Toronto, a Standard Poodle was invited to participate in the prestigious 'Gold Whistle' Retriever trials. John Hamilton and his Tudorose Valencia Shadow, WCX had the distinction of being the very first Standard Poodle to challenge these Retriever trials a couple of years ago.

This time, the honour fell to Emily Cain and her multi-titled Standard Poodle, OTCh Walnuthill Castor of Tudorose, WCX, SH. This is a very difficult set of retrieving trials, which are run indoors in conjunction with the Sportsman's Show in front of hundreds of people. Congratulations, Emily and Castor....you did Poodledom proud!!

The first ever Poodle Club of Canada Working Certificate Sanction Match was held on Thursday, June 20<sup>th</sup>... This was a history-making event for the Poodle Club, as prior to 2002 we were not eligible to hold WC Tests, even though Standard Poodles could compete. Poodles do not handle their retrieving duties exactly like Labs or Goldens or Chessies.....they have their own style of retrieving ...which is very intense but still, very distinctly Poodle! We are not trying to turn our dogs into some sort of Non-Shedding Retriever ....we want Poodles to still be Poodles. but remember, they are considered to be the 'world's oldest retriever'. They can still do the job they were bred for.....and, believe me, they do it with a great deal of Poodle flair!! As of this year, all varieties of Poodle can compete in WC tests.....Miniature and Toy Poodles now have the opportunity to rediscover their hunting heritage too!

## Can., Danish, & Luxembourg CH. Ormar Midnight Memories

*Knight - Finished his Canadian title as a puppy, with a Group First and multiple group placements. In very limited showing, he won 9 Group Firsts, 4 Group Seconds, 1 Group Third, and 1 Group Fourth. His first show out in the U.S., he won a 4 point major and followed it up the next weekend out with a BOB over Specials from the puppy class, under poodle authority Mr. Denis McCoy. Knight accumulated 9 points in the U.S. including a major in just 3 weekends of showing. At 15 months old he left for Europe to start his show career there. He was shown a total of 17 days (ONLY) and has won 10 CC's, 6 CACIB's, 3 Group Firsts, 1 Group Third, BIS-2 and Specialty BIS -2. He is ranked No. 1 Poodle in Denmark, and won 2nd Place in the Open Dog class at the World Show in Amsterdam. At a show previous to the World show, he defeated the Crufts BIS and World winner, white standard poodle. By 22 months old, and in only 17 shows, Knight completed all the requirements for the FCI, International championship and will be granted this title in October of this year.*

*He is siring stunning puppies in Europe, in black and cream. He is fully genetically tested and his hips rated A-2 (EXCELLENT). Knight will be back home in October of 2003, following which he will complete his U.S. title and special occasionally.
