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sources do not agree and none of them deal with a pattern that breeders encounter if they breed long enough, especially if they Colour cross in their breeding. So my review has turned into a research project.

For this first part I am simply going to review the sources available. Colour genetics especially in the Poodle is a complex genetic problem and there is no simple nontechnical route to a clear understanding. If a breeder is going to be proactive rather than reactive (i.e. Their is a 12% chance of a mismark. rather than, my GAWD where did that come from?!). That breeder is going to have to learn more genetic terms than dominate and recessive. If all you want is a rule of thumb, than I refer you to Dr. Joanne Reichertz As I See It article in a recent Poodle variety entitled; Colour When You Plan A Litter Do You Get What You Expect? This article covers the basics although I am not totally in agreement with the section on Blues and Silvers. Another good guide is found in Eileen Geesons; The Standard Poodle. Her chapter on colour is particularly helpful because she indicates which colours should be

crossed and which should not.

There are three books which

are good sources for Poodle

colour genes although none

are complete in itself and

needless to say they do not agree with each other nor do they use the same notation to identify genes, buyer beware. The basic essential study on canine colour genes is Clarence Little's: The Inheritance of Coat Colour in Dogs c 1957. This book is well worth obtaining. Clarence Little was associated with the Bar Harbour study of development of dogs (from which all our knowledge of temperament testing and the stages of personality development has been learned.) Started in the mid 40's the Bar Harbour study examined colonies of purebred dogs and their crosses until well into the '60's. Little also did extensive breeder surveys. The next major updating of colour genetics was Malcolm Willis's; Genetics of The Dog c1989. This is an English source and reflects breeding practices in that country. For Poodles he is not as complete as Little but he also throws up his hands in horror at making sense of colours as breeders call and register them. The last major examination of colour genes to my knowledge is Roy Robinson's; Genetics for Dog Breeders, 2nd ed. c1990. Roy Robinson was a biologist with a fascination with practical colour genetics. At a time when research geneticists were becoming involved with DNA studies, Robinson continued to address the practical problems of Mendel genetics. If you want to learn how genetics work this is

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the book to buy. Robinson leads his readers from the simple to the complex always using colour genes as examples. His information on Poodles however considers only solid colour so it is incomplete (e.g. blues.)

Long time members of the Poodle club have available another source, a colour chart developed by Dr. Leonard Butler for the club in 1959 - 1960. Dr. Butler was head of non-human

genetics at the University of Toronto and had particular qualifications in colour genetics. I have used his colour chart for the past 40 years and have found it a most valuable resource. In the next part of this article I will review the essential genetic terms and look at the basic colour genes. I hope that by that time the questions I have sent off to the geneticists will have gathered a reply.
